 - 2023's symposium was published in Pediatric Nephrology: World Kidney Day 2023: preparing for the unexpected, supporting the vulnerable! Daga A, Bjornstad EC, McCarthy F, Bonilla-Felix M. 2023.
 - 2024's symposium occurred successfully on April 3, 2024. The largest to date with >170 attendants. We had several non-nephrologists in attendance as well.
 - Several ASPN and IPNA members served on the planning committee.
 - This year's theme was: Task Shifting Basic Nephrology to General Pediatricians: Beyond UTIs; with keynote speaker, Mignon McCulloch
 - We have begun planning for 2025 symposium and will begin formal planning in the coming months.
- ASPN-IPNA-HVO trilateral partnership (Cambodia)
 - Lead: Dorey Glenn, Assisting Lead: Anisha Gerber
 - Platform designed/curated by HVO, which allowed recording lectures, and other resources for future use. 31 virtual sessions occurred from 2021-2023.
 - Recruiting for inperson volunteering ongoing.
 - o One ASPN volunteer traveling to 2 HVO sites in 2024
- Local-global Partnership (Haiti)
 - Lead: Ankana Daga, Assisting Lead: ???
 - Ongoing discussions with IPNA and ALANEPE on supporting Dr. Judith Exantus, sole pediatric nephrologist
 of Haiti, as they recover from recent natural and man-made disasters (hurricanes, earthquake, political
 unrest, gang violence).
 - Discussions have occurred and continue around short-term goals of sending supplies during recent hurricane and earthquake, and an ongoing needs assessment with Dr. Exantus
 - Plan to invite Dr. Exantus to give a talk to our group or at future ASPN/ASN meeting to gather more support and raise awareness
 - Overall, the political/violent situation in Haiti has only continued to worsen, despite the lack of news coverage. It has greatly limited these efforts but we remain committed to supporting our partnerships with IPNA, ALANEPE and Dr. Exantus. We have been able to continue to engage when internet/safety permits participation in our global health efforts.

- 5. We continue to promote member achievements and committee/ASPN opportunities through social media, ASPN emails, and committee emails to communicate with members. We plan to also adopt the ASPN mobile app as well.
